SPOTLIGHT: MAJ. GEN. KELLY MCKEAGUE ΓΑ 1493

It's Time to Change the Narrative

Brother Kelly McKeague FA 1493 has at one time been identified as "pledge," "cadet," "IFC president," and even "eminent Commander" in his time at Georgia Tech. These days, he is addressed as major general, a promotion he received from the U.S. Air Force in 2008 and a status that a select few officers will ever receive.

At lunch at the Gamma Alpha Chapter house on April 22, this accomplished brother introduced himself as Kelly, slinging the grip and proudly identifying himself simply as "1493." Brother McKeague recalled that the day he, "Kelly," mistakenly received his allfemale dorm assignment at Tech was also the first day he had ever left Hawaii, his birth state. After Brother McKeague greeted every brother in the room personally, the lunch conversation transitioned to adapting to new challenges with rush, new risk areas for Greek life at Georgia Tech and the recent strides our active chapter has made in the areas of philanthropy. At the end of lunch, our discussion led the Major General to address the room with a few proud words, calling his audience "... first-rate men of high moral fiber and great character."


It became clear to me that Brother McKeague measures his own success by his

relationships, attributing many of his basic leadership skills to his time within the walls of Gamma Alpha of Sigma Nu. As far as Brother McKeague is concerned, he is simply an alumnus, like us. He has been fortunate enough in his career to return to his birthplace and spend time near his parents. In town for his first meeting after being asked to serve on the board of the School of Industrial & Systems Engineering (ISyE) at his alma mater, he and his wife

were able to swing a trip to Fort Benning to visit their son, who had just recently returned from a deployment in Afghanistan. In addition to his successes as a family man and an engineer with undergraduate and master's degrees from Georgia Tech, his career accolades with the USAF are too numerous to list here.

After discussions about today's fraternity stereotypes and badly spun news stories, Brother McKeague insisted that "it's time to change the narrative: it all starts with what you do and how you present yourself." He spoke with a sense of pride as he commented on the current state of the chapter. Coming from such an accomplished leader, I thought his remarks and his tone were especially inspiring. As actives and alumni finished exchanging questions and answers with the Major General on his success and that of our chapter, I was able to scribble down his closing remarks: "The common thread is this institution and what it gives you ... What you have here at Sigma Nu only enhances that experience. I have no regrets, and I was very proud that people associated me with this fraternity."

We extend our thanks to Brother McKeague for his special visit and words of inspiration.

Brother Shaves Head and Raises Money for Childhood Cancer

For the fifth year in a row, **Sam Eichenblatt TA 2025** shaved his head with 300 others to raise money for the St. Baldrick's Foundation. The March event occurred at RiRa's Irish Pub.

Over the past five years, this event has raised over a half a million dollars toward childhood cancer research. (Most of that is supporting St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital.) In 2011, Sam asked potential sponsors how much they would donate

toward childhood cancer research if he shaved his head. The answer he got was \$500. This past year, when he asked the same question, the answer was \$1,000! That's a compounded annual growth rate of 20%!

Therefore, Sam decided to follow this trend and set his 2015 goal to \$1,200, and thanks to support, he exceeded it! Sam says, "I just wanted to send out a big thank you for your love and support! Together we raised over

\$1,600 for local childhood cancer research. At RiRa's, we raised over \$150,000!"
